The following record of the above families, including, but not limited to, several other branches; Kerr, Clack, Clark, Houk, Rogers, Chandle, Walker and others was compiled by a great-grandchild of James Randles and his wife Rhoda Clack Randles. He was the grandchild of Westley Huffaker and Frances Randles Huffaker. Doubtless Mrs. Venie Jones Drake, sister of Alvin Bill Jones, will furnish the name of the author who makes mention of compiling this material "as of this writing in 1912" and his final notation date was June 25, 1925.

Mrs. Raymond Carl Brumley (Florence Mary Victoria Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Bill Jones and Niece of Mrs. Venie Jones Drake), of Austin, loaned the writer, C. B. Smith (son of Etta Jones Smith and grandson of Solomen Bramlett Jones) of Austin, Texas, the original typed "onion skin" paper copy which he is reproducing verbatum on the following pages 2 through 15.

It is interesting to note that the original families migrated from Virginia to Sevier County, Tennessee; thence to Dallas County, Missouri; thence to Texas, Oklahoma and further west. However, many are probably still living particularly in Tennessee and Missouri.

The manuscript material that is quoted consists of 10 pages plus copies of a letter written by Rhoda Randles in 1844 and one written by Fanny Huffaker; also a one page supplement to the Jones family history.

"A FAMILY HISTORY"

(as copied from manuscript completed June 25, 1925)

In the year of our Lord, 1760, or near that time, a sailing vessel from Germany landed in one of the harbors along the coast of Virginia. That beautiful country was not the "old Dominion" then, the proud mother of Presidents, but an oppressed colony, and far the greater part a solitary land, inhabited by Indians and the wild beasts of the Forest. In the motley crew of men who were tossed about in the little ship was a mere youth who would never never see his native land again. He was not driven from his country by the weight of oppresion, neither by the force of penury, but fascinated by the wonderful stories of America, came of his own free-will.

The young man's name was <u>Hofecre</u>, in the German tongue, <u>Huffaker</u> in English. Whether his parents bore in mind the beautiful story of Daniel and the prince when they called him <u>Michael</u>, no one knows, but we are told that in goodness and purity of life this young Michael was a prince with men and worshipped the God of Daniel.

After spending some years by the sea, Michael turned his face westward, and, with a few brave men, journeyed through the primeval forests settling finally in what is now known as Southwest Virginia.

The descendants of this hardy frontiersman have but a faint conception of the environments that surrounded him. He dwelt in a house built of heavy, hewn logs; the doors swung on strong wooden hinges. We fancy that over the door to the main entrance rested the old flint-lock rifle, ready to be lifted down when the howl of the wolf was heard; when the scream of the panther startled the stillness of the place, when hostile Red men appeared, and perhaps, when it was to be shouldered in the defense of his country.

Many of Michael Huffaker's descendants today live in great cities; they see great throngs of men; they hear the din of unbroken moving wheels, the roar of wagons, the clanging of cars, the whir of automobiles. And when the day is gone a thousand incadescent lights gleam upon the asphalt streets. But to this man there was no voice of the multitude; the sound of horse's feet and wagons was muffled in the thickly fallen leaves; and when the sun had sunk beyond the hills, the narrow fields and vast forests lay in darkness, save for the light that God had given.

What does it matter, the shifting scene, the onward pageant of the world?
What better is our day than his? With all the gilded splendor of our world,
we are but as a vapor that fadeth away, and the Earth itself will be dissolved.

In that day the righteous shall be as the sons of God, and the light from the Throne will illumine their dwelling place. And as for the wicked, no human power can form light in that outer darkness.

Our grandparent had his pleasure; his world was as beautiful to him as ours is to us. The emerald and the beryl stone shown in the limpid streams; the glow of the sun-set kissed the purple mountains. There was joy to him in beholding the wild creatures that lived in that lonely place, the graceful deer resting beneath the leafy shades, the fawn playing by the crystal waters.

Michael was a devout man, and with a small number of helpers, built the first Methodist church of that country. It was called Mahanaim. Michael Huffaker's home in Washington County, near Saltville, was called Greenfield. He married Catherine Cathe, born in Germany.

There were eight sons and two daughters. These were their names: George, Peter, Christian, Jacob, John, Isaac, Henry and Justus. One of the daughters married a man named Koontz, the other one, a Smith from whom was descended the late Tobias Smith, a Methodist preacher of great repute among his brethern.

This brief record now follows but one branch of the family, the one in direct line from Justus. Christian, Jacob, John and Isaac went to Powell's Valley, Tenn., Justus and George settled on the fertile banks of the French Broad River, in Sevier County, Tenn., while Henry remained in Virginia.

It is a fact worthy of note, that in that part of the country where so many sons were born, no Huffakers are now living. The son who stayed at home never married, and his estate was given to aid in the founding of the famous college at Emory, Va.

Justus Huffaker was born in 1765 and died in 1828. Both he and George were buried at the Seven Islands, the place where they had interred their mother; the place where so many of the coming generations were to have their final rest.

Justus married Sarah Kerr, who was born on the ocean, soon after her parents sailed from Ireland. One of her sisters married a Baker who moved to Mo.

There were three sons and three daughters: Nelson, who died in childhood; Samuel, who died at the age of twenty; and Westly, who inherited the homestead; Catherine, who married William Thomas; Mary, whose first husband was James Cunningham, the second, James Huffaker, son of George; Sarah, who married William Wayland.

Justus Huffaker was a man of great strength of mind and character, and manifested a thirst for learning that became strongly developed in some of his progenitors. He and his wife were strong Presbyterians, but through a dissension with the commissioners over building a church, he withdrew from the Calvinists and allied himself with the Methodists. He was a warm friend of the Quakers, who often met at his house for worship.

Here there is a digression: One <u>Spencer Clack</u> came from Wales and entered a tract of land where the town of Sevierville now stands. His children were: Rolly, John (killed by lightning), <u>Rhoda</u>, Catherine, Mary, Vina and Nancy.

Rolly's sons were Spencer and Missouri. Nancy married Henderson; Malvina married Bevers, Catherine married Miller.

Missouri Clack located in Meigs County. Spencer and Dr. Morgan Clack of Rockwood are among his descendants.

Rhoda married James Randles of Irish descent. There were five sons and seven daughters; namely, John, Richard, Spencer, James and William, Frances, Mary, Betsy, Sarah, Bethinda, Malvina and Nancy.

John married Mary Rodgers. James married Polly Houk. He was the father of John Randles who married Sallie Huffaker, daughter of Frances, Spencer married Betsy Cowan; Mary, W. H. Stone; Betsy, Kenneth Rector; Sallie (a dwarf), Nathan Patterson; Malvina, Jesse Pasley; Bethinda, Brazil Blair; Frances, Westley Huffaker, son of Justus, grandson of Michael.

William and Richard moved to Alabama. Nancy died at the age of 18.

In the union of Wesley Huffaker and Frances Randles, Welch blood was added to the German and Irish.

Wesley was born about 1806 and died in 1865. He was a man of considerable wealth; his intellect was strong, his hand was open to all in need, and his love of truth and honor even as that of his fathers.

Frances Randles, his wife, was a fit companion to the noble husband. The writer remembers her as she appeared to him when he was a little boy. She was old, and children do not much like the aged, but her wrinkled face was so full of tenderness and love that we little folk clung to her as to our own mother. To our childish understanding she was the embodiment of

goodness. Her faith was as the faith of Mary, her feeble steps were in the foot-prints of her Lord. Long years have passed since then; through the vanity and wickedness of the world our faith has often been shaken, but through it all lives the memory of that holy woman, and we know that the spirit of God dwells in the earth.

There were three sons and seven daughters: James, Napoleon, Robert, Adella, Caroline, Nancy, Julia, Sarah, Josephine, Frances, and Mary, who died in infancy.

Robert Wesley Huffaker died in the year of the surrender, a prisoner of war. He was the idol of that large family, making his tragis death seem more tragic. Within prison walls he gave up his young life that was so full of promise; there was no friend with whom to speak the parting word, no fond breast on which to rest his weary head. His elder brother walked the streets of the city, beholding the dim light that shown through the barred windows of his cell, He pleaded earnestly with the guards that he might be permitted to speak with the dying brother. At last the petition was granted but when he entered the gloomy chamber the brave young soldier had fought his last battle.

Roberts remains were brought from Indianapolis and interred in the church yard where so many of the kindred sleep; there where the mournful sound of rolling river never ceases, where the sighing winds move among the leaves. His grave will soon be forgotten; a time will come when when no one will know that there ever was a civil war, a time when the earth shall be dissolved with fervent heat; when the stars shall fade away, and the sun himself grow dim with years, but his soul will live in immortal youth, amid the wreck of matter and the crash of worlds.

My Dear children

I have again taken my pen to address you. I will in the first give my reason for not writing sooner. We had written a short time before we received yours of June last which we expected you would get. In that we gave you the news of the day with a request that you would write soon. We have been waiting not knowing whose turn it was to write until my patience is quite exhausted. I will in the first place inform you that I am in good health and enjoy a peace of mind which the world can neither give nor take away for which my heart rises in gratitude to my Heavenly Father for his goodness to me. I find that his promise is sure where he says I will be with you in six troubles and will not forsake you in the seventh. I find great enjoyment in reading his holy word. I have also some very excellent religious books with which I am very much interested.

The Baptists have had a camp meeting on the hill just the other side of where Brazeal lived. It commenst the second Saturday of October last. Cannon and Beleu were the preachers who officiated mostly. They seemed to preach with power and such a time I never before witnessed. The old and the young came flocking in like sheep to the fold. Such shouting and singing I have seldom heard before. To me it was a happy time. How could it be otherwise when I saw so many enlisting in the cause in which I have engaged for more than half a century and still find it to be a good one. And there was another thing I must relate. Spencer Gist rose and in a very feeling manner exhorted the people to seek their true interest which was the salvation of there souls wile the big tears rolled down his cheek. The whole congregation felt their force. There was but few who did not weep. Sixty profest religion and among the number was old Hugh Blair and five of his children. Saul Andrews and his wife and many of their children. Hannah Brter and two of her sons and Montgumery Canan. My children I hope you will not neglect the salvation of your immortal souls. Endeavor to live for God. Train up your children in the fear of the Lord. I would be very glad to see all but if that cannot be let me hear from you after. If you have heard from Jack or from James let me hear from them as they have both quit writing to me. Sally Pattison and John Q. A. came to see us in September. She has very good health and appeared in good spirits. The friends in this country are well and doing pretty much as usual. I must bring my letter to a close by requesting you again to write soon and tell me all about what you are doing and how you are getting along. Farewell for the present and believe me to be your affectionate mother.

(To her son Spencer and his wife)

Dear brother and sister

To me it is a pleasing task to converse with you by letter since it is the only way we can become acquainted the conditions and prospects of each other and I promise you that nothing on my part shall be wanten to keep it up. I will in the first place tell you something of our prospects. I think we are likely to get something out of Pattison yet which was almost hopeless case. He is here tonight and thinks if he could get three or four hundred dollars more he could get along. He land was sold under a deed of trust which he wishes Wesley to redeem and take the land and of course find him a home. I cannot tell what they will do yet. I think times are improving in this country a little. There has been a great many hogs sold here for which they get good money down. Wesley received eight hundred and seventy dollars for his which if he had been out of debt he would have felt but this was not the case nor is he yet out but we are trying very hard and hope in the course of another we will probably succeed.

James has commenst reading law under Hinds. He is very well pleased with the study and is getting as far in three months as Hinds allowed him in six. The girls are getting along I think well enough. Adelia has a son. She calls him John Wesley.

Nancy is teaching school this winter and I think the children are learning fast. Julean is studying grammar and geography. Sary is studying Perley's Tales. Josephine is just beginning to read. Meria out learns any of the rest of our children at her age. Napoleon is just beginning to take some interest in reading. He is pretty good in figures and lastly Robert Wesley is just learning how to walk. He is just nine months old and is a very manly looking child. I reccon if our children could all be together they would make a very great display of beauty and smartness since you have so much of both. Dear little creatures how glad I would be to see them. Tell them their aunt loves them if she cannot see them. I cannot tell you how much I wish to see you both. The children all wish to be remembered in love to you all. Wesley bids me present his best respects. He wishes you to write him everything you can think and says he will write before long. I have ommitted giving you the news of the day for this reason. Richard will tell you all. I must close by bidding you adieu for the present.
